
"PICS" RESEARCH METHOD

Developing the Big Picture in Service Learning



Meaningful service learning requires well-planned research! Although internet searches and print materials can be useful sources, other forms of research must be utilized in order to optimize your efforts. The "PICS" method consists of four research methods to help collect valuable information that can be used to develop an impactful service learning project.

- <u>Publication</u> any type of visual or print reference that is published and available digitally or in print. These include books/newspapers/magazines, internet sites, films, and videos.
- Investigation involves surveying the opinions or experience of a group of people, based on a series of questions.
- <u>Consultation</u> includes interviewing an individual who is skilled or knowledgeable in the area that you are researching. This includes both school and community members.
- <u>Surveillance</u> involves observing a situation, location, or group that connects to your area of research and noting your findings.
