Oral History Project Instructions

Interview an individual you consider a generous leader. Your storyteller could be a prominent community leader or someone who is quietly making a difference. Seek to learn the personal stories and traits of generous leaders. If everyone conducted themselves like servant leaders, it would be a better world to live in.

Step 1: Download the Story Corps app at: https://storycorps.org/participate/storycorps-app/. Explore the app's main features and learn how it works.

Step 2: Choose someone to interview. Begin with the people who are most meaningful to you and people you admire. You may call upon neighbors, teachers, people from your faith community, VFW halls, and retirement communities. Many people enjoy being interviewed. You may be surprised how people bond over this experience.

What was the happiest moment of your life? The saddest?

Who has been the biggest influence on your life? What lessons did you learn?

How has your life been different from what you imagined?

What is the hardest thing you have ever had to do?

What are you proudest of in your life? Why?

Tell a story about a cultural tradition observed by your family and why it is important?

Do you have any favorite story, or antidote about life that you would like to tell?

What was it like where you grew up? What was your childhood like?

What were your parents like? Where are your parents from? Have they told you any stories about growing up or living where they're from? Have you ever been there? What was that experience like?

What are the most important lessons you've learned in life?

How would you like to be remembered?
