- Jane Addams: She is often described as a selfless person who devoted her life to helping the poor. - Susan B. Anthony: Susan was known as a self-disciplined, tireless worker who fought for various women's rights. - Andrew Carnegie: He has been called "the richest man in the world," however, he had a heart of gold. Among his achievements were the founding of the Carnegie Institution and the Carnegie Corporation, both of which enabled various colleges and universities to conduct research. He also embarked upon a campaign of world wide library building because he thought that education was important.  on rich and poor alike. He also helped to develop the M.A.S.H. (Mobile Army Surgical
 Hospitals) and invented many medical devices, such as the artificial

- Sebastian S. Kresge: He was known as a caring person who believed in sharing his wealth with the common good. He developed a chain of dime stores and established the Kresge Foundation to celebrate his company's 25th anniversary. - Rosa Parks: Rosa is a dedicated, determined woman who believes in equal rights for all. She has been called the "mother of the civil rights movement" for refusing to give up her seat to a white man on a bus in Montgomery, Alabama in 1955.
