

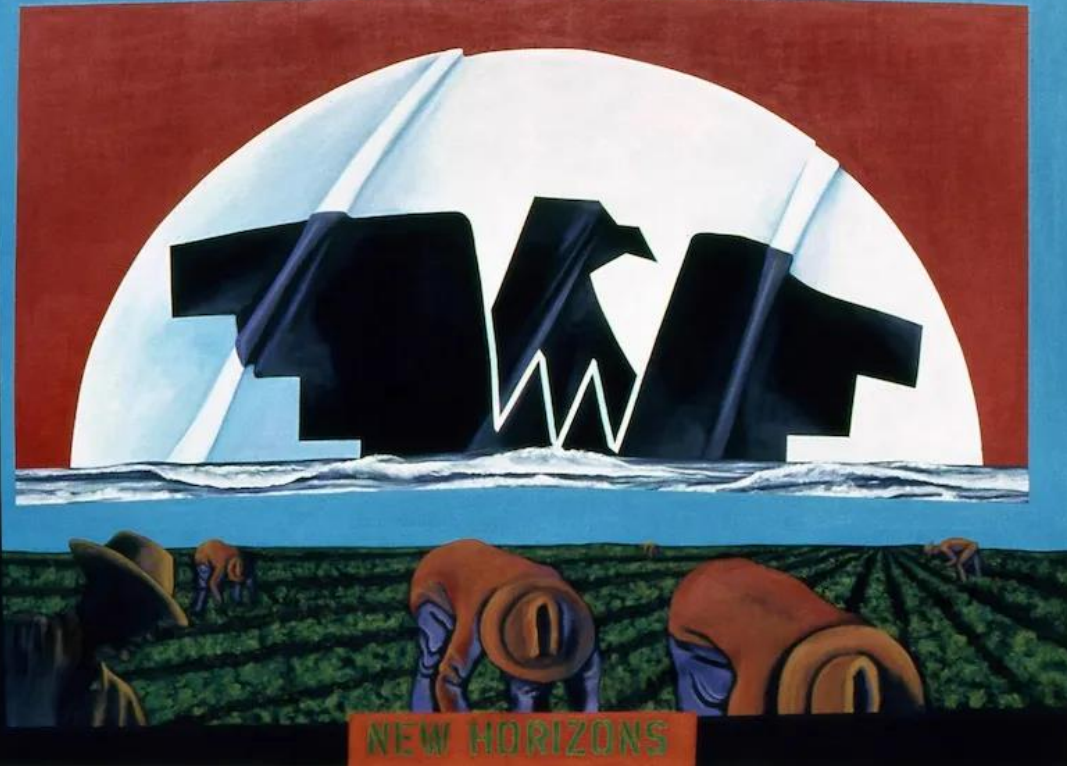

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Sun Mad Raisins
by Ester Hernández

A first-generation Chicana, Ester Hernández is a key figure in the Chicano civil rights art movement that emerged in America in the late 1960s. Her most famous image, the screenprinted poster Sun Mad, was first created in 1981 and expresses her anger at the human and environmental cost of pesticide use in commercial grape growing in California.

Hernández's skeleton dramatizes the lethal consequences of pesticides and at the same time firmly locates the print in the tradition of Mexican printmaking dating back to José Posada, whose calaveras (skull) illustrations satirized Mexican society at the end of the 19th century.
