Philanthropy Responds to the Covid-19 Pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic was a global health crisis that began in late 2019, shut down most of the world in 2020, and impacted life for everyone in the next several years.

People and organizations contributed funds to research efforts for vaccines and treatments, provided financial aid to struggling families, donated medical supplies to healthcare facilities, and supported frontline workers with essential resources. Many philanthropic organizations put equity in the center of their work and grantmaking.

Neighbors supported neighbors with encouragement and volunteerism, using extreme creativity to help from a "social distance." People acted to address the social and mental health challenges of the pandemic. Additionally, philanthropy played a significant role in disseminating accurate information about the virus and promoting public health measures.
